General Information

The initiation, implementation and continuous coordination of projects between a particular Inter Country Committee (ICC) pair of countries is done by working committee in each country mirroring the other. Each country working committee has office bearers: National Section Head, a Vice National Section head, Hony. Secretary, Treasurer and at least one member from each participant district. The office bearers as above alternate between the participant districts.

The role of ICC is analogous to a rotary embassy of one country responsible for continuous communication with the rotary embassy of other ICC paired country/ies. The difference from National Country embassies is that in rotary case the ICC embassy remains in its own country in each pairing.

Through continuous communication of ICC paired countries working committees evolve bonds of friendship, credibility and information exchange on cultural / business and ongoing / potential rotary service projects which lead to mutually beneficial collaboration between Rotarians of paired countries to achieve successful community service projects in each country/ other countries if required.

The ICC is a resource to rotary districts regarding international service projects initiation and implementation and includes exchange of knowledge, technology, finance and evaluation of community service projects.

The ICC proactively supplements the projects completion effort of every participating rotary district in a staff role. The executive governance of each rotary district remains with the district governor and his district officer in accordance with applicable rotary constitutional documents and rotary code of policies.

Inter country committees (ICC) In Rotary

The ICC is an affiliate program accredited by Rotary international and similar to rotary action groups (R.A.G.S.) based on common hobbies or service areas of interest. It is not a program administered by the Rotary board of Directors. The ICC is managed by an Executive Council which elects/ selects its office bearers every two years.

The objectives of an ICC are encouraging sustained contact between Rotarians, rotary clubs and rotary districts in two or more paired districts. The sustained contact leads to deep bonds of friendship, sister clubs arrangements, friendship/ family exchange delegations, business delegations, cultural assimilation and joint community service implementation collaboration in each paired country. The program gives a true flavor and experience of Internationality of Rotary. When all districts in a country agree to an ICC with all districts of another country, we have an ICC with its memorandum of Understanding (M.O.U.), charter of activities and an official charter as per template approved by ICC executive committee.

In process of forming an ICC, if minimum two districts in each paired ICC country wish, they may form an sub national ICC and gradually invite other districts in each country to join the program by signing a protocol of Agreement.

The work of the sub national/ National ICC is carried out by following:

1. National Coordinator (NC) in each country who overseas and motivates rotary clubs and districts in his/ her country to form an ICC







ICC working committee mirrored in each paired country led by a National Section head/ President/ Chair person, A vice Chair, a Hon secretary, a treasurer and two Rotarian members deputed by district governor of each participant district.

These committees in each paired country will initiate activities in consonance with objectives given above. Each activity is recommended to be monitored, finance arrangements made and recorded and contributions from committee members from each district are expected when their district is involved. The tenure of the working committee is indefinite subject to explicit consent of the National Coordinator in consultation with current district governors and approval of ICC executive committee.

We in India, till date have 45 ICCs at sub national level and 27 more are in pipeline. Since rotary internationally is present in 200 plus countries, the potential to form ICCs is immense. The ethos of an ICC is fellowship and service with humanity at its core over riding technicalities, positions and titles the role of which is just responsibility. Through this periodic E newsletter we will share with you salient information on ICCs formed, those in progress and potentials within our reach. We will also share snippets/ summary of accomplishments of ICCs over a period of time.

I encourage you to contact us and with consent of your district governor become a part of this wonderful program to give true shape and substance to the essence of rotary international mission: "We the people without boundaries join hands to do projects to make a positive sustained impact on lives of challenged world communities and in return earn their blessings which enrich our spirit enveloping it in perennial happiness.

MEMORANDUM OF UNDERSTANDING (MOU) FOR THE ESTABLISHMENT OF AN INTER COUNTRY COMMITTEE (ICC) BETWEEN INDIA AND CANADA

Dated: Monday June 26th 2023

The rotarians, Rtn. Deepak Talwar and Rtn. Nevine Yassa, ICC National Coordinators of India and Canada, respectively, along with ICC initiating and forming districts through their current district governors mentioned here in under agree to sign this MOU in order to encourage continuous contacts between interactors, rotaractors, rotarians, rotary clubs rotary districts (herein after called as rotary entities) and service minded non rotary entities of both countries to promote and facilitate fellowship, intercultural understanding and community service projects between India and Canada and other countries if required.

To reach these said objectives, the ICC working committee of each country will facilitate periodic continuous communication between themselves, rotary entities and service minded non rotary entities.

Through continuous communication among other things, the ICC working team/s will promote and facilitate individual or group friendship exchanges, business and cultural delegations / develop a network of paired sister clubs in each country and facilitate them to have virtual / physical joint meetings to support current and future Rotary club, rotary district and rotary partners service projects, including the Rotary Foundation Global Grants.

The two countries ICC working committees will further act as bridge to connect non Rotarian individuals and entities to join rotary projects in both countries/ other countries to awaken and keep alive the rotary spirit in societies and communities.

It is understood that the ICC actions and activities are a proactively available resource, support and supplement available to districts in each country to support their service goals to meet the objectives of the rotary movement.

Under the above conditions agreed and accepted by the two national sections of ICC India - Canada, they will follow a mutually acceptable time bound charter of activities in accordance with ICC terms and conditions applicable in rotary constitutional documents and rotary code of policies and abide by procedures and policies set by the ICC Executive Council of rotarians which oversees implementation of ICC objectives in world rotary.

The national coordinators of each country in due course, agree to regularly invite non participant districts in each country through their district governors to join this ICC by signing the established protocol of agreement and deputing at least one district rotarian to serve on the country ICC section working committee.

This M.O.U. signed by the participant districts through their below mentioned district Governors as on date and the ICC National Coordinators of the two countries, as on date, establishes the ICC between Indía and Canada.

The President of the ICC India – Canada from the side of India will be Rtn Namrata Suri and from the side of Canada will be S. Rajagopal President.

SAMPLE CHARTER OF ACTIVITIES

Objectives:

- •To provide a network which will unify Rotarians of India and Pakistan.
- IP-ICC will be a vehicle which will bring Rotarians together on common issues. IP-ICC will hold activities for bilateral humanitarian and peace efforts, using programs and initiatives fitting into RI Strategic Plan. It will increase fellowship and inter cultural understanding amongst the people of both nations.
- To focus and coordinate to work as a team for long term commitments and create a climate of Goodwill and peace.
- Rotarians, spouses, retractors to participate in IP-ICC activities giving local expertise in each of the two countries and serving as ambassadors of Countries. Every member of the team is the ambassador of the partner country in his or her country.
- To work as team for common cause.
- To address for peace and conflict resolution which is one of the focus areas of the Rotary Foundation.
- To provide significant support to all programs of Rotary international.

Charter of Activities:

- 1. Identification of one major community service project to be implemented in RI 3271 or 3272 and one major community service project to be implemented in RI 3011 or 3012 with major resources Contribution by Rotarians in the other country with your without being a Global Grant.
- 2. Have youth exchange teams.
- 3. Conduct essay competition and debating competition at school and college level. Maybe we can have participants through video link.







- 4. Have a joint Facebook page of India and Pakistan, what's app and other social media tools for all Rotarians from Pakistan and India. Similarly, we can have one for the retractors. Singing competition between youth of both countries.
- 5. Have dress also member of committee on both sides.
- 6. We can also have District teams visiting both districts.
- 7. Sister clubs can have joint meetings once a month or once in two months though Skype in which we can invite social activists, media reps, Business community, youth representatives, professionals and Intellectuals to share views through video link.
- 8. We have a joint bimonthly or quarterly newsletter called ICC India Pakistan, Bulletin.
- 9. We ask all DG's to dedicate one page for views and news of Rotary clubs in each other's countries.

- 10. Send delegations in RYLA held in both countries.
- 11. Make sister rotary clubs by pairing clubs of RI 3011 with clubs in RI 3271 and 3272 and pairing rotary

- 12. Proposed activities of paired clubs:
- One community service project each, one in Pakistan and one India with major resources by Pakistan club for India club project and vice versa. Project may be financed by global grant or otherwise. Once these projects are implemented, they should be widely publicized through print media, social media, and electronic media and in district conferences and other rotary meetings







- One reciprocal per annum by club members to the sister club on home hospitality basis.
- Each sister club to create what's App/telegram groups of members of each club and keep each club apprised or major activities of the sister club.
- Each sister club to create a blog/social media film on common life in the area of the rotary club
- Including its community service activities/fellowship activities and widely share with the sister
- Club/other district through social media.
- Send one representative at least to an annual peace conference organized by the Inter country
- Committee in India and Pakistan on an alternate basis on annual basis. f) Make a business directory of self-club and sister club members and circulate via social media/digital basis.
- 13. Hold an annual Peace Conference, one year in India and next year in Pakistan. Topics to be interactive with aim to generate positive ideas, discussions on resolution and reconciliation of pending disputes as perceived by both countries.
- 14. Hold one business/trade fair annually in each country on alternate basis for list of selected business of Rotarians or otherwise where attendees would be interested Rotarians or non-Rotarians of host/guest country.
- **15.** India districts to propose one delegation of maximum **10** persons for a period of maximum seven nights to Pakistan and vice versa annually:
- a) School students or College students
- b) Members of the Press corps of the other country

(Each visit will have a definite approved agenda full of opportunities to imbibe the culture and life ethos of the other country.)

Home hospitality will be the basis of visit to maximum extent possible.

We will expect the press corps members of delegation after the visit to publicize the community service projects which Rotarians in other country are implanting in India or Pakistan and create an aura of goodwill and an ambience of her love affection and trust in which to work towards resolution of perceived inter country disputes







- 16. Planned liaison with Embassies of the other country and ministry of interior/home in own country on regular basis with aim of:
- Facilitation of obtaining visit visa for Rotarians and others of the other country.
- Creation of a list of Rotarians and prominent society members of the other country to which the Embassy/
 Got of other country grants long term visit visas with minimum restrictions on a
- Got of other country grants long term visit visas with minimum restrictions on a regular basis.
- Incorporation of other country Rotary events in a rotary year on calendar of Interior/home ministry in host country so that visas applied for are issued easily.

- D) With the exception of a multidistrict PETS, which shall be under the direct authority and control of the governors-elect in cooperation with governors, the ultimate responsibility for multidistrict events, activities, projects and organizations lies with the governors of the districts involved.
- E) Recognition of a multidistrict activity, project or organization by RI in mo way implies legal, financial or other obligation or responsibility on the part of RI. A multidistrict organization may not act on behalf of RI, or represent or imply that it has authority to act on behalf of RI. A multidistrict organization is not an agency of RI. Multidistrict organizations must be self-sustaining financially, administratively, and otherwise.
- F) In instances where multidistrict activities, projects and organizations are incorporated, the members of the corporation should be the governors of the districts involved or their appointees. The board of directors of any such incorporated activity, project or organization should be elected by the members of the corporation. Corporate structures not in harmony with these provisions will generally be considered as not in conformance with RI policy regarding supervision of multidistrict activities, projects and organizations by the governors. 21.020. Intercountry Committees

Intercountry committees promote relationships between two or more international districts or two or more countries to increase fellowship and intercultural understanding among the people of various nations, foster stronger ties between members, clubs, and districts from different countries, and establish networks across borders, continents, and occans.

While only districts may form and join intercountry committees, individual Rotarians, their partners, Rotaractors, and Rotary and Rotaract clubs may participate in their activities. (October 2019 Mtg., Bd. Dec. 45)

21,020.1. Activities of Intercountry Committees

Recommended activities for Intercountry Committee participants include, but are not limited to: visiting each other's countries and homes, strengthening friendships and projects so formed by encouraging clubs and districts to connect with clubs and districts in other countries, and contributing to world peace.

Intercountry Committees may also:

- · exchange best practices for sponsoring new clubs
- develop a sister or twin club relationship between clubs in participating countries
- conduct Friendship Exchanges between the two countries
- initiate or carry out International Service projects
- initiate or carry out Vocational Service projects (October 2019 Mtg. Bd. Dec. 45)

21.020.2. Establishing an Intercountry Committee

Intercountry Committees can be national or sub-national relationships between two countries. National intercountry committees require the consensus of all districts in a country. Sub-national intercountry committees require the consensus of all districts participating in the relationship. An established Intercountry Committee shall inform the Executive Council of its formation.

A. Establishing a national Intercountry Committee

To form an Intercountry Committee between two or more countries, approval from all of the countries' district governors must be obtained. District governors from a given country who wish to delegate decision-making authority for establishing new national Intercountry Committees may do so with unanimous consent of all district governors in the country.

Interested Rotarians in each country should form a planning committee to establish an Intercountry Committee. The responsibilities of the planning committee include obtaining approval to organize an Intercountry Committee from each district's governor, electing an Intercountry Committee chair to lead the relationship, identifying potential projects, and activities for the ICC participants to undertake, and organizing a planning meeting. The name of an intercountry committee shall be taken from the names of the participating countries. Should a district decide to leave the relationship, the relationship shall evolve into a subnational Intercountry Committee.

B. Establishing a subnational Intercountry Committee

To form a subnational Intercountry Committee between two or more districts, approval from all of the district governors must be obtained.

Interested Rotarians in each district should form a planning committee to establish a district-level Intercountry Committee. The responsibilities of the planning committee include obtaining approval to organize a subnational Intercountry Committee from each participating district governor, electing an Intercountry Committee chair to lead the relationship, inviting club presidents from each district to participate, identifying potential projects and activities for ICC participants to undertake, and organizing a planning meeting. The name of a subnational Intercountry Committee shall be taken from the names of the participating districts. Should a district decide to leave the relationship, the name of the ICC shall be updated to reflect the remaining participants. (October 2019 Mrg. Bd. Dec. 45)

21.020.3. Governance

An Intercountry Committee is led by an Intercountry Committee chair, elected from participating districts for a three-year term. Intercountry Committees must abide by the rules governing organizations in their country and shall have officers including a chair, secretary, and treasurer. The chair should serve for three years while the other leaders should rotate on an annual basis. (October 2019 Mtg., Bd. Dec. 45)

21.020.4. Relationships with Districts

Intercountry Committees are encouraged to collaborate with the district governors of participating districts as well as their district international service committees, if one is appointed.

Intercountry committee chairs may contact district governors, district governors-elect, and district international service committee chairs in their country regarding the formation of a new ICC or to annually invite participation in an existing ICC relationship. (September 2020 Mrg., Bd. Dec. 36)

21.020.5. ICC Executive Council

The ICC Executive Council is a resource for districts and countries wishing to form a new Intercountry Committee. The Executive Council collects and shares best practices for forming Intercountry Committees and subsequent projects and activities. The Executive Council maintains a list of Intercountry Committee Chairs and active Intercounty Committees, made available through its website.

The Executive Council is led by a president, secretary and treasurer, elected by reported Intercountry Committee chairs. The president of the executive council serves a three year term, acts as the liaison between intercountry committees and Rotary International and submits an unnual report to RI in July each year. The annual report shall include contact information for Intercountry Committee chairs, a list of Intercountry Committee relationships, and a summary of major projects and activities. Failure to submit an annual report by I August will result in termination of the president's term and will require the Executive Council members to elect a new president. The Executive Council may collect modest optional fees from established ICCs to cover website expenses. The Executive Council may not create additional governance or leadership positions for individual Intercountry Committees, nor does it have authority to approve or decline the formation of new ICCs. Intercountry Committees shall function without financial support from Rotary International. Modest optional fees may be collected from participating districts to cover operating costs of an Intercountry Committee. The fees may be used for administrative purposes or to support humanitarian projects and cannot be used to offset travel or other expenses incurred by an individual as a result of participating in activities organized by an Intercountry Committee or the Executive Council elects to collect fees, the Intercountry Committee's leadership or Executive Council's leadership shall prepare a budget of estimated income and estimated expenditures for the year at the beginning of each fiscal year. All bills shall be paid by the treasurer, or other authorized officer, only after approval by two other officers. An annual financial review by a qualified person shall be made of all the Intercountry Committee's and Executive Council's financial transactions and be shared with all participating districts. Discussion

Project: Medication from India to Lebanon

After inquiry, Rajnish explained that the medications can be easily collected, yet the problem is how to send them to Lebanon. The attendees agreed that the best way to do it is through the Lebanese Embassy in India.

Actions

- Lebanese ICC partners shall make contact with the Lebanese Embassy in India and solve the sending issue.

Metals for Recycling

The cooperation program between the state educational institution "Special School No. 188 of Minsk" and the Rotary Club "Minsk"

GUO "Special School No. 188 of Minsk" is the oldest educational institution for children with visual impairments in Belarus. Over its more than a century-old history, the school has undergone a lot of changes, both in the way of work and the principles on which the education of this category of children is based. One of the most important tasks of the school is the training and upbringing of a full-fledged socialized personality of a student who will be able to be independent and successfully realize himself in later life. For the successful implementation of this task, school teachers teach children not only basic educational knowledge, but also the use of technical correction tools that allow children to be mobile and move independently, as well as to be independent in everyday life.

Also, one of the conditions for high-quality education, upbringing, development, habilitation and rehabilitation of children with visual impairments is an accurate understanding by specialists of the features of the state of visual functions of each child and their accounting in the system of psychological and pedagogical impact. All the knowledge and skills acquired by children at school are successfully applied by them in practice and give students full-fledged ideas about the world around them, which allow them to successfully interact with it. The purpose of the cooperation is to increase the level of socialization and learning ability of schoolchildren with visual impairments, by equipping the material and technical base of the school, as well as organizing the interaction of children with the FIU with children enrolled in the program of secondary schools.

Tasks:

- ensuring the psycho-emotional well-being and health of participants in the educational process, using the skills of social partnership for personal and harmonious development;
- development of students' ability to adequately navigate in an accessible social environment;
- improving the quality of life (learning and socialization) of children with visual impairments by equipping the material and technical base of the school;
- Improving the quality of available services in the field of culture and sports and reducing information barriers for visually impaired students through the creation of an accessible cultural space through typhocommentation.

• Explanatory note

Modern school is becoming more and more confident as a full-fledged component of the social sphere of society, reflecting the characteristic features of our time. Given the high pace of development of society, special schools are also forced to constantly adapt to new realities. All this contributes to the quality education and development of children with visual impairments (developmental features). However, building a high-quality educational process can be difficult without social partnership and interaction between organizations, which provides ample opportunities for individual development of students, their realization in adulthood.

For high-quality and full-fledged education and socialization of children with visual impairments, additional equipment of the material and technical base of the school, the introduction of electronic learning tools and information communication technologies is necessary. All this allows students to be prepared and successful at the next stages of education, as well as the active involvement of visually impaired people in the atmosphere of cultural or sports activities, which ultimately will ensure accessibility and barrier-free for all categories of citizens.

Areas of cooperation

1. Organization of a video conference with school staff and parents (guardians) of students on the topic "Organization and provision of psychological assistance". Date of the next videoconference: November 5, 2022









- 2. Restoration of the work of the ophthalmologist's office on the basis of the school. The presence of an ophthalmologist in the school contributes to the qualitative and timely monitoring of the condition of the visual analyzer of students, the appointment of treatment depending on the stage of correction, the recommended hardware treatment. Another important point is the continuity in the work between an ophthalmologist from a specialized kindergarten for children with visual impairments and a school.
- 3. Training of specialists in typhocommentation or organization of cooperation between the school and existing specialists. Typhlokommentation is a concise description of an object, space or action that a blind or visually impaired person is unable to perceive due to visual impairments. Such a description is usually prepared by a typhoon commentator.
- 4. Equipping the school with video magnifiers. At the moment, the school has purchased 5 video enlargers out of 14 requested. Three of which were donated to the school by the Rotary Club, two more were purchased by the Department of Education.
- 5. Organization of annual meetings of students of the GUO "Special School No. 188 of Minsk" with students of the GUO "Zhupranskaya Secondary School named after F.K.Bogushevich" on the basis of one of the schools, in order to increase the socialization of children with visual impairments, as well as to increase the level of awareness and education of secondary school students in matters of interaction with children with special needs development.

The program was agreed and approved on 11/14/2022.

"Bulba Fest in Zhuprany"

Rotary Club Minsk organized a meeting (departure by minibus) of 12 children of the sponsored school 188 of Minsk for children with visual impairments to the village of Zhuprany – a sponsored school for the event "Zhupransky picnic" (held every six months – a meeting of children from 2 sponsored schools).

This time the meeting was dedicated to the World Food Day.

World Food Day, celebrated annually on October 16, was proclaimed in 1979 at the conference of the Food and Agriculture Organization (FAO) of the United Nations. The main goal of this Day is to raise the level of awareness of the population about the problem of hunger existing in the world.

Events and competitions were organized during the meeting:

- 1. Recipe contest "How to use leftovers: non-obvious ideas for breakfast, lunch and dinner" (send photos and descriptions of recipes online in advance). According to the results of the competition, an online recipe book is compiled, which is posted on the websites of schools for public access.
- 2. Contest of clever and clever girls "What do you know about potatoes?" a team game with questions about the properties of potatoes, its history, interesting facts and volcanic riddles.
- 3. Culinary Bulba battle. 3 mixed teams take part in the competition, each with 4 participants: 2 schoolchildren from the Zhupran school and 2 schoolchildren from school No. 188. The teams draw out the name of the dish (draniki, croquettes and casserole) and cook it for 30 minutes. All participants of the Fest taste and vote.
